## Hotel

Our block of 25 rooms will be held until **March 20**, after which time regular rates will apply for available rooms. There are several DoubleTree hotels in Austin. Please note that our hotel is located at **6505 North Interstate 35**, four miles north of the university. Our hotel and others in the area are very busy this weekend, so don't delay!

## Transportation

The hotel is four miles north of the university and Saturday night's restaurant is a mile south of the university, so attendees will find that our venues are conveniently located and easily accessible, but cars will be necessary. [Parking at the Ransom is available in a deck](#) and surface lots, and there is a public deck near the restaurant.

## Meals

- Everyone is welcome to congregate at the [hotel restaurant for dinner](#) on Friday night. If you know that you would like to do this, please contact Stephanie, as the Courtyard Café has different options for us depending on headcount.
- Lunch on Saturday will be catered box lunches. \$16.
  - Lunch must be pre-ordered. You will select among six sandwich options, a fruit or mixed greens salad, and sparkling or still water or Mexican Coca-Cola. All meals come with chips and salsa and a cookie. Food selections will be made when you pre-order.
    - The sandwich options are: TFB Hero, Chicken Salad on Sourdough, Smoked Turkey on Whole Wheat Sourdough, Smoked Ham & Cheese on Rustic Sour Rye, Roasted vegetables and chevre, on Focaccia, and Pimiento Cheese on Whole Wheat Sourdough.   - Dinner must be registered for and pre-paid, and you will be able to select your food choices at the restaurant. ## Speakers

**Dr. Danielle Sigler** is Associate Director for Research and Programs at the Harry Ransom Center at the University of Texas at Austin. She received her Ph.D. in American Studies from The University of Texas at Austin in 2002, and her primary areas of research include African American history and American religious history. At the Ransom Center, she has curated the exhibitions *Banned, Burned, Seized, and Censored* (2011) and *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* (2015), and co-curated *The King James Bible: Its History and Influence* (2012). Sigler is co-editor of the anthology *The New Black Gods* (Indiana University Press, 2009) and her work has appeared on the *New York Times* Disunion blog and *The Daily Beast*.

**Dr. Francine Abeles** is professor emerita at Kean University in Union, NJ, where she was distinguished professor of mathematics and computer science and head of the graduate programs in mathematics, computing, statistics, and mathematics education. She edited three volumes in the Pamphlets of Lewis Carroll series, wrote a chapter on Dodgson's work on voting theory in *Lewis Carroll Observed*, a chapter on his mathematical work in *yours very sincerely C. L. Dodgson (alias "Lewis Carroll")*, and a chapter on three popularizers of mathematics including Dodgson in *A Bouquet for The Gardner*. She is the author of nearly one hundred papers on topics in geometry, number theory, voting theory, linear algebra, logic, and their history, many dealing with Dodgson's work. She is a frequent speaker in special sessions on the history of mathematics at meetings of the American Mathematical Society, and at meetings of The Canadian Society for the History and Philosophy of Mathematics. For twenty years Dr. Abeles was a member of the editorial board and Reviews Editor of the international journal *Modern Logic* and its successor, *The Review of Modern Logic*. She served as the Treasurer of the LCSNA from 1990 to 2014.

**Christopher Morgan** is the author of *Games, Puzzles, and Related Pieces*, volume five in the LCSNA series *The Pamphlets of Lewis Carroll*. He is a writer, computer scientist, puzzle designer, musician, and magician. He has twice hosted International Puzzle Parties in Boston MA and Washington DC.

**Joel Birenbaum** is a former president of the LCSNA, and has been an Alice collector for more than thirty years. He is also the creator of the original Lewis Carroll Homepage, the Alice in Wonderland Collectors Network, and the Alice150 Facebook group. For today, his most important accomplishment is that he came up with the idea for an Alice150 celebration seven years ago, and is the Coordinator of that project.

**[Bridgette Mongeon](#)** is a master sculptor/ writer and public speaker. She is known for her portrait busts of legends such as B. B. King, Bill Monroe and Willie Nelson, along with her numerous sculptures of children. Her commissioned artwork is collected around the world. An avid reader, she is thrilled to create a magical wonderland of interaction that encourages exploration, math, literature, art, technology and more, for both young and old alike.
