### Venues and Speakers

**The Internet Archive** has digitized over a million books and is digitizing more at the rate of a thousand a day. It also hosts recordings of music concerts, TV programs, and has produced an accessible “snapshot” of the World Wide Web every two weeks, resulting in an archive of 150 billion Web pages, from 1996 to date.

**The Walt Disney Family Museum**, 104 Montgomery Street,<sup>1</sup> The Presidio of San Francisco, 415) 345-6800 features exhibits about the life and legacy of Walt Disney. Artifacts on display include Walt's original 1/8-scale Lilly Belle train, a series of still drawings demonstrating one minute of footage of *Steamboat Willie*, and an early conceptual scale model of Disneyland.

**Lauren Benjamin** is a Master's candidate at Sonoma State University, with a focus on fantasy as resistance literature, as well as visual culture.

**Mark Burstein**, president of our Society and editor emeritus of the *Knight Letter*, is a professional book editor, whose collaborations include *La Guida di Bragia*, Linda Sunshine's *All Things Alice*, *Pictures and Conversations: Lewis Carroll in the Comics*, and *Alice Illustrated*, coming from Dover this spring.

**Sandor Burstein**, a retired physician, is a noted collector and former president of our Society, and co-founder with his son, Mark, of the West Coast Chapter of the LCSNA, which was active from 1979 to 1987. He will be speaking about acquiring Alice Liddell's accordion, which has been fully restored and will be played, we are hoping by a talented young lady.

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**Selwyn Goodacre**, a retired physician, noted collector, and former chairman of the Lewis Carroll Society (UK) and editor of its journal, *Jabberwocky*, for 23 years, has spoken and published widely on textual, bibliographic, theological, and medical aspects of Carroll's life and work. He was the editor of the Pennyroyal *Alices*; his most recent book is *The Illustrated Editions of the Hunting of the Snark* from Inky Parrot Press.

**Bob Hornback**, the owner of Muchas Grasses, is a professional horticulturist and horticultural historian who works with the Luther Burbank Farm in Sebastopol, California. He teaches botany at campuses throughout the northern Bay Area and is a well-known garden writer and speaker.

**Stan Isaacs** has been collecting Carroll for over thirty years, since he inherited his grandfather's collection; Stan's emphasis is on mathematical works, translations, and the many illustrators. He also has a world-class collection of mechanical puzzles.

**Brewster Kahle** is a computer engineer, internet entrepreneur, activist, and the founder of the Internet Archive and the Open Content Alliance, a group of organizations committed to making a permanent, publicly accessible digital archive of cultural artifacts. At M.I.T. he studied artificial intelligence under Marvin Minsky, and from 1983 to 1992, was a member of the team that developed the WAIS system, a precursor to the World Wide Web.

**James Saint Cloud** is a friend and adherent of "David Rosenbaum" of the Continental Historical Society, which promotes the idea that Carroll was a mere front for the books' true author, HM Queen Victoria. James is nearing completion of *The Alice Code*, a novel bearing this theme.

**Dan Singer** is a collector and maven of Disneyana and Carrolliana, and worked for many years as a Disney "Imagineer." He is also the co-author of the popular *The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (abridged)*.

**Charles Ware** (1921 – 2005) was an extraordinarily talented San Francisco artist with a large body of work, mostly prints, that dealt in Wonderland and Looking-glass World. **Alan Selsor** is the agent for his estate.

**James Welsch & Rachel Eley** met in Oxford. They have maintained the blog at our website since its launch last year, and have been compiling "From Our Far-flung Correspondents" for the *Knight Letter* since 2009.





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## SUNDAY, APRIL 17



Yes, Snoopy, Petaluma, in California's "Wine Country," about 40 minutes north of San Francisco, and where you were born sixty-odd years ago at the Daisy Hill Puppy Farm. Members of the LCSNA and their guests are cordially invited to an open house/viewing of the Burstein Collection, housed in a three-story tower on a ranch there.<sup>ii</sup> We'll be open from 9 A.M. to 2 P.M. There will also be an exhibit of *Alice*-related original art from the *Knight Letter*, from Mark's collection of comic strip art, and pieces from *Peanuts*, on loan from the Schulz Museum, about twenty minutes north in Santa Rosa (and also well worth a visit!). An exhibition of Charles Ware prints (for sale) will also be mounted. Address and directions will be provided at the Saturday meeting, or by request.



**Part II:** The Walt Disney Family Museum in the Presidio of San Francisco. Robert Hornback, in association with The Garden Conservancy, will present his illustrated talk "A Garden Tour of Wonderland" at 3 pm, followed by a 4 pm screening of the 1951 Disney classic film.

Exhibits in the museum focus on Walt Disney's life and career. Artifacts on

display include Walt's original 1/8-scale Lilly Belle train, a series of still drawings demonstrating one-minute footage of *Steamboat Willie*, and an early conceptual scale model of Disneyland.
